

Pediatric Neuropsychology Clerkship

Summary

The Baker Center for Children and Families (previously Judge Baker Children's Center), a Harvard Medical School Affiliate, is accepting applications for a clinical Neuropsychology clerkship at the Center for Effective Therapy (CET), the outpatient mental health service program at The Baker Center for Children and Families, which serves children and adolescents ages 2-22.

The Neuropsychology Program and CET provide state of the art diagnostic and evidenced based treatment services to patients with a range of neurodevelopmental, neurological, and neuropsychiatric differences. We are accepting applications for a Pediatric Neuropsychology Clerkship for advanced doctoral students in clinical or school psychology. This clerkship provides hands-on training in pediatric neuropsychological assessment within a high-paced outpatient behavioral health clinic. The placement is designed to help students build foundational skills in test administration, scoring, and clinical reasoning with children and adolescents presenting with a wide range of developmental, neurological, and psychological concerns.

Common Referral Questions Include:

- Learning disabilities (e.g., dyslexia, math disorder)
- Attention-deficit/hyperactivity disorder (ADHD)
- Autism spectrum disorder
- Executive functioning weaknesses
- Effects of prematurity, epilepsy, genetic conditions, and medical/neurological diagnoses

Essential Duties and Responsibilities

Under the supervision of licensed pediatric neuropsychologists, clerks will participate in all phases of the assessment process, including:

- Conducting clinical interviews and behavioral observations
- Selection, administering and scoring neuropsychological and psychological tests
- Assisting in case formulation and diagnostic impressions
- Writing integrated reports and providing feedback to families and referring providers
- Attending weekly supervision and didactic seminars as part of a dynamic multidisciplinary team

Commitment & Supervision:

This is a part-time (e.g., 16–20 hours/week) placement. Students receive individual and in vivo supervision, feedback on written work, and access to interdisciplinary case discussions. Training aligns with APA and Houston Conference guidelines and is intended to prepare students for future competitive internship and postdoctoral positions in neuropsychology.

Qualifications and Skills



- Enrollment in a doctoral (PhD or PsyD) program in clinical, school, or counseling psychology
- Coursework in child development, psychological assessment, and psychopathology
- Previous experience with test administration preferred
- Strong organizational skills and ability to work independently and collaboratively
- Interest in pediatric neuropsychology and child mental health
